

## THE MYSTERY OF COMMUNION

From June 2014 Upper Room



**Paul wrote: “As often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord’s death until he come.”**

For a long time I questioned the point of Holy Communion. Then one day it dawned on me as I walked from my pew to the altar rail—a walk that was longer than I’d thought.

For me, Communion celebrates the long walk of Christ from life to crucifixion to resurrection. It is the walk that Christians around the world make each Communion service. It is the walk that the saints in heaven walked long before us. The bread we eat reminds me of the manna that God provided to the Israelites in the desert. The wine is the life-giving blood of God’s grace that Christ gave for our salvation.

At Communion the story of our faith is constantly being retold and demanding to be heard. At Communion we are committing to serve our brothers and sisters—even the entire world. And when we glimpse the truth that lies within the mystery and Communion becomes more revelation than routine, our lives are radically transformed. Communion is a miracle that empowers and encourages us to take the love of God into the world for the sake of Christ.

## FOR EVERYTHING A SEASON

Wanting his sons to learn not to judge too quickly, a man sent each, in turn, on a quest to look at a pear tree far away and report what he saw.

The first son went in winter, the second in spring, the third in summer and the fourth in fall. Finally, the father gathered the young men together. “What did you see?” he asked.



The first son reported seeing an ugly tree, bent and lifeless. The second disagreed, saying it was budding with fresh new life. The third son reported finding a tree laden with sweet-smelling, beautiful blossoms, while the fourth son insisted it drooped with ripe fruit.

The father said his sons were all correct, for they’d seen the same tree, though at different seasons of its life. “Don’t judge a tree—or a person—based on just one season of life,” he counseled his children. “Who they are can only be known at the end, when all life’s seasons have lived.”

“Furthermore,” he added, “don’t give up on your own life if you experience a hard season, such as winter, or you’ll miss out on the renewal of spring, the joy of summer, the fulfillment of autumn.”

## **Cleaning Bucket for Flooding in Detroit**

**Storms hit the City of Detroit on Monday, August 11, dumping a record rainfall that shut down major freeways and damaged churches, homes, and businesses. Wayne County and several cities (Royal Oak, Warren, Ferndale) have all declared a state of emergency. Red Cross has mobilized volunteers across the area. United Methodist Committee On Relief has also been on site to reach out to these communities.**

**What can we do to help? We can assemble and deliver flood buckets. Please let Pastor Marianne know if you would like to donate items for flood buckets. Holly Morrison will be assembling the buckets. Pastor Marianne will be delivering.**

**Following are the items needed:**

### **5-gallon bucket with resealable lid**

**Buckets from fast-food restaurants or bakeries can be used if washed and cleaned;  
Do not use buckets that have stored chemicals such as paint or pool cleaner;  
Advertisements on the outside are acceptable.**

### **Liquid laundry detergent**

**One 50-oz. or two 25-oz. bottles only.**

### **Liquid household cleaner**

**12-16 oz. liquid cleaner that can be mixed with water;  
No spray cleaners.**

### **Dish soap**

**16-28 oz. bottle any brand.**

### **1 can air freshener**

**Aerosol or pump.**

### **1 insect repellent spray**

**6-14 oz. aerosol or spray pump with protective cover.**

### **1 scrub brush**

**Plastic or wooden handle.**

### **18 cleaning wipes**

**Handi Wipes or reusable wipes;  
No terry cleaning towels;  
Remove from packaging.**

### **7 sponges**

**No cellulose sponges due to mold issues;  
Remove from wrapper.**

### **5 scouring pads**

**Remove from wrapper;  
No stainless steel, Brillo pads, or SOS pads (nothing with soap built in). (continued)**



Cleaning Buckets continued from previous page:

50 clothespins

Remove from packaging.

Clothesline

One 100-ft. or two 50-ft. lines;

Cotton or plastic.

24-roll heavy-duty trash bags

33- to 45-gallon sizes;

Remove from the box.

5 dust masks


2 pairs kitchen dishwashing gloves

Should be durable enough for multiple uses;

Remove from packaging.

1 pair work gloves

Cotton with leather palm or all leather.

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## Soul touches sole in the City of Detroit

“He can sell a refrigerator to an Eskimo!” That old chestnut about salesmanship may soon be joined by another ... “They can sell sandals at the North Pole!” The United Methodist Pastor, Rev. Faith Fowler reports that Detroit Treads, manufactured by Green Industries of Cass Community Social Services (CCSS), surpassed \$50,000 in shoe sales their first month. “Once something ends up on the internet,” Faith says, “it can go everywhere. We’ve now sold Detroit Treads in 44 states, including two pairs in Alaska!”

With only eight states to yet make a purchase, it’s clear that Detroit Treads ... made from tires dumped illegally all over the city ... are becoming a best seller for Green Industries. Started in 2007, the operation launched with a couple good products: Mud Mats employed 12 men; document shredding provided jobs for another 50. A third group of men was brought on to the production line last year when coaster sets began to be manufactured out of wood and glass salvaged from abandoned buildings.

The latest product launch took place during a fireworks event in downtown Detroit on June 23. From there it’s “Gone wild!” according to Fowler, the Executive Director of CCSS. The sandals are distinguished by an Old English D “of our design, different than the Tigers’.” Their website states their mission: “To create a unique, stylish and sustainable sandal that affords wearers a comfortable way to express their Detroit pride, while empowering CCSS workers to gain vital skills and work experience.”

Five more persons have been hired for this new venture. “We’ll keep picking up people as we go,” Fowler explains. “We get no corporate grants or government money so our expansion will be built around sales.” Currently it’s taking about 36 hours a week to keep up with orders.

Over 6,000 volunteers a year—from high schools, colleges and churches—come to the Cass neighborhood. They not only lend a hand, they lend self-esteem and hope to employees. “When the volunteers come, people in Green Industries become the teachers,” Faith explains. “They take a great deal of pride in that.”

Green Industries has given birth to a whole new sport that Faith calls, “Tire Hunting. It requires no guns, no bullets and no dogs.” Some of the volunteers become tire hunters, roaming over 140 square miles, searching the city streets and responding to phone calls. Since 2007 over 35,000 tires, brought in a few hundred at a time, have been converted into useful objects. The Mud Mats used the sidewalls; now the sandals use up the treads. (And the sandal straps are recycled from seatbelts.)

Sandals are available for women and men in sizes ranging small to x-large. Cost is \$25 plus shipping. [Orders may be placed on the website](#) or by phone: call Sue Pethoud at (313) 883-2277ext. 203.

A fashionable product that promises profit. Yes. But the greater promise is in the transformation of 85 lives taking place at Green Industries. “These are jobs,” Faith asserts, “not job training. Lots of organizations do job training. When we hire a person, he or she is drawing a paycheck.” Further, it takes special qualifications to be hired by CCSS. “We look for people who have barriers to employment,” the director notes. “Many of the developmentally disabled can’t read. Some have asthma, AIDS, or PTSD. Others have been in prison. Those we hire are those who other folks don’t want to take a chance on.”
